Fr. Mark's Pastor's Message:

St. Joseph's Church began fifty years ago. When I reflect on this I think back on what the word "church" has meant to me in my life. My earliest memories of "church" are of my parents taking me to Sunday Mass at Presentation Parish in Stockton. I have sweet memories



of the dark interior of the church, the baptistery, the beautiful crucifix, the old confessionals, and the altar rail where I would kneel for hours looking at the beautiful statues. One Sunday my mother pointed to an altar boy and asked me if I would like to be an altar boy myself. I looked up and asked "Do you get paid for that?" Eventually I did become a volunteer altar server and I came to know the priests and the musty smell of the sacristy. I always tell people that I became a priest because I loved the smell of the stale Holy Water inside of Presentation Church.

Presentation Church is similar to our St. Joseph's church in that it was originally built as a social hall with the intention of later building a real church. But eventually it was decided to make do and remodel the interior to make it more "churchy". The result was a church which was sufficiently beautiful to inspire my young heart to love the things of God. And I'm sure all of us will agree that St. Joseph's church now has a beauty that has inspired several generations of Modesto Catholics. In 1999 an arsonist set fire to the sanctuary of Presentation Church and then it no longer smelled of Holy Water but only of smoke. So the church as torn down and finally the people of North Stockton built a real church. St. Joseph's Church originally smelled of pizza! For the first two years Mass was celebrated in "Pappy's Pizza Parlor which was at the corner of Oakdale Rd. and Scenic Ave. It all began for us on October 11, 1967 when it was officially announced to the parishioners

of Our Lady of Fatima Church that their parish would henceforth be divided so that those who lived East of Sunrise Avenue would be part of the new parish which did not yet have a church building. If you were a part of the origin of St. Josephs Catholic Church please contact us at 209-551-4937.

What is a "church"? A church is more than just a building but is the assembly of God's people who are called out of the world. We form one Body with Jesus Christ as the head (1Cor. 12:27). On Earth the Pope is the head of the universal Catholic Church, the bishop is the head of a local church, and the pastor is the head of the parish. The Catholic Church is 2000 years old and we have many ancient laws which are preserved in the Code of Canon Law. Recently I dusted off my Canon Law book and opened it to see what it says about a "parish". It says "A parish is a certain community of the Christian faithful stably constituted in a particular church, whose pastoral care is entrusted to a pastor..." (Canon 515) It then goes on to describe all of the "pastoral care" which must be provided in a parish. It is list of things that a pastor could easily accomplish back in the days when there was a parish priest in every tiny village:

"A pastor is obliged to make provision so that the word of God is proclaimed in its entirety to those living in the parish; for this reason, he is to take care that the lay members of the Christian faithful are instructed in the truths of the faith. especially by giving a homily on Sundays... He is to have particular care for the Catholic education of children and youth... and those who have ceased the practice of their religion... The pastor is to see to it that the Christian faithful are nourished through the devout celebration of the sacraments and, in a special way, that they frequently approach the sacraments of the Most Holy Eucharist and penance. He is also to endeavor that they are led to practice prayer even as families... A pastor is to strive to know the faithful entrusted to his care. Therefore he is to visit families, sharing especially in the cares, anxieties, and griefs

of the faithful, strengthening them in the Lord... With generous love he is to help the sick, particularly those close to death, by refreshing them solicitously with the sacraments and commending their souls to God; with particular diligence he is to seek out the poor, the afflicted, the lonely, those exiled from their country... He is to work so that spouses and parents are supported..." (Canons 528-529)

We would need ten priests to obey this law of knowing and caring for every lost sheep in the flock! It is easy to see why we need to divide parishes and encourage more vocations to the priesthood! The Code of Canon law does, however, provide a bit of practical advice on how the pastor can accomplish this huge task: "A pastor is to recognize and promote the proper part which the lay members of the Christian faithful have in the mission of the Church..." (Canon 529) This means that lay people are also stewards who are responsible for part of the work! During the fifty years of our history there have been only three pastors: Fr. Anthony McManus (1967-1970), Fr. Cornelius DeGroot (1970-1975), Fr. Joseph O'Hare (1975-2000), Fr. Joseph Illo (2001- and myself, Fr. Mark Wagner (2012-present). These pastors have been assisted by other priests, but the work has been supported by the hard work and sacrificial giving of our lay parishioners.

March 1 is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of our time of Lenten prayer and sacrifice. It is a good time to remember the sacrifices of all those who have built up our parish by praying gratefully, serving responsibly and giving generously.






