


Treasures New And Old

The Catholic Church has many beautiful treasures, new and old, which she freely gives to her children. There is beautiful artwork for us to see, ancient documents for us to read, wonderful stories for us to hear, and nourishing sacraments for us to receive.

In a few short days, I experienced treasures both new and old. Recently, I went to a beautiful Mass at my favorite church, Cathedral in Stockton, which is my home parish and where my parents live. It has beautiful, colored stained-

glass windows with glorious images of Mary; it was built to replace the aging "St. Mary's" downtown, to be the "New St. Mary's." Eventually the bishop decided not to tear down the "Old St. Mary's," and the new church was renamed "Annunciation Cathedral," while the downtown church got stuck with the name "Old St. Mary's." Every year on the Thursday before Holy Week there is a special Mass called the "Chrism Mass" when the bishop blesses the holy oils which are used for the sacraments throughout the year. All of the priests of the diocese concelebrate and make their annual renewal of the priestly promises which they made on the day of their ordination (obedience to the bishop and his successors, celibacy and daily prayer of the Liturgy of the Hours). For this Mass, the Cathedral is always packed with enthusiastic Catholics who sing loudly! It seems like the building is filled with the Holy Spirit because all of us were anointed with those sacred oils when we were baptized, confirmed and ordained to the priesthood.

A few days later, on Palm Sunday, I made an announcement at the end of Mass that seemed like bad news. I said: "Today a couple from our parish lost their son." I broke the uncomfortable silence by saying: "Today their son entered a monastery to become a monk!" It was a beautiful but sad day for his parents, Richard and Maria Braun, when their son Nicolas entered the Monks of the Most Blessed Virgin Mary of Mount Carmel in Wyoming.

They will only be allowed to visit him once a year. Besides praying, these are "cowboy monks" who wear ten gallon hats and rustle cattle! They also roast "Mystic Monk" gourmet coffee beans which they sell online. In addition, they are using modern building techniques to build a huge Gothic Church and monastery in the middle of nowhere. In the Middle Ages it took centuries to carve similar buildings out of stone, but three dozen monks have completed this



amazing project using laser beams to cut and carve huge blocks of stone.

The following day the world was shocked to see the ancient Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris go up in flames. The roof burned, the spire fell, and many medieval treasures were charred. But life goes on. New churches rise up in the wilderness. The Catholic Church will rise up from her ashes. In truth, the Church is not made of ancient stonework and stained glass. The Church is more than antique statues and ancient artifacts. The Church is made up of living stones, washed and anointed so that we become God's temple: "You were washed, you were sanctified... Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you... So glorify God in your body (1Cor. 6:11,19; 1Peter 2:5).

The work of the Church goes on. We must become saints. Next month is the month of May, the month of "Notre Dame" ("Our Lady"). She gives us the graces of her son. On June 9 we will celebrate the Feast of Pentecost, the celebration of our belief that the Holy Spirit fills us and inflames us with a fire that can recreate society.

One modern woman from North America is well on the way to becoming a saint: Concepcion "Conchita" Cabrera de Armida (1862-1937) will be beatified on May 4 at a special Mass in Mexico City. I will be in attendance with a large group of parishioners. Conchita seemed to be an ordinary wife and mother,



but she was transformed by many extraordinary mystical experiences. After her husband died she became the foundress of the order of nuns who have a convent here in Modesto. She saw the vision of the special Cross which we have erected in front of our parish buildings on Lancey Drive.

The Spirit has also been at work in the life of another young man from our parish who will be ordained a priest on June 9 at the Cathedral in San Francisco. Michael Rocha received his sacraments and his inspiration from our St. Joseph's Parish, where his mother is still a parishioner. Deacon Michael (soon to be Fr. Michael!) has participated in many of our liturgies over the years and we are proud that St. Joseph's has produced another vocation for the Church. The photo below shows Michael receiving a chalice from parishioner Marya Pimental. Deacon Michael will be serving in the Diocese of San Francisco. We will still look forward to those days when he is visiting his mom in Modesto so that he can also visit his home parish at St. Joseph's.



Let us pray for Michael and for Nico who have discovered the treasures of our Catholic faith and have chosen to give up everything to obtain it. May all of us learn to "live the faith" and become new saints for the Church!

What is an annulment? Many people are unclear about what is meant by this Catholic word. It is a very Catholic concept which does not exist in any other religion. Some people think that it is simply the Catholic word for divorce, but this is not true. Once you understand it, you will see that it is actually a precious treasure that is provided to us by our Catholic Church law. Annulment allows people to experience hope and healing after the tragic wound of divorce.

The entire law of the Churchcalled "the Code of Canon Law"

is a great treasure that comes to us from the ancient wisdom of the Church. Our country has codes of law, some of which are over two hundred years old. Our Code of Canon Law is two thousand years old! It is constantly being revised and expanded, but the important laws have never changed. We should be as grateful for the gift of our Catholic laws, just as the Jews were grateful to God for their laws: "This great nation is truly a wise and understanding people...



Just the Facts:

For what great nation has statutes and ordinances that are as just as this whole law which I am setting before you today?" (Deuteronomy 4:6-8)

Annulment is a gift of love. It acknowledges that our efforts at love are

It acknowledges that our efforts at love are sometimes weak and uninformed. We all think we know love, but perhaps we were too young to truly understand love as God wants us to participate in it. We all make mistakes. Annulments are a process provided by Holy Mother Church so that we can continue to live in a state of grace and continue to receive the gift of the Holy Eucharist every Sunday.

Annulment isn't Catholic divorce.

It is a declaration that the marriage was never a true marriage. There was a marriage, of course. We do not deny that it was a marriage. We call it a "civil marriage" or a "common-law marriage" or an "attempted marriage." We do not use derogatory words about the children born of the marriage. The Church teaches that annulment does not affect the children at all. Annulment is simply a process of discovering and proving that the marriage was not a sacramentally binding marriage. It is a detailed study of the marriage which attempts to discover reasons why the person is not required to return to the former spouse; this must be proven.

In the civil law of our country, a person is innocent until proven guilty.

According to Canon Law, a marriage is valid until proven otherwise. The Catholic attitude is that a person who has been married by a priest should always assume that the marriage is valid. Sometimes a spouse is abandoned or abused and a separation is necessary. Sometimes a restraining order is necessary to ensure the health and safety of the offended spouse. Sometimes a legal separation or a legal divorce is necessary to force the spouse to fulfill their financial obligations. Nevertheless, a spouse should pray for the conversion of the other spouse. They made a promise of love forever. Sometimes the Catholic attitude is to remain single and leave a lamp burning by the window in hope that the spouse would change and return home.

Annulments

Many people think that once a divorce happens, they can no longer receive Holy Communion.

This is not true. It is only when the person tries to remarry or to live together with a third person that there is question of not being able to receive Communion. When the person is insisting on committing adultery, as Jesus said: "But I say to you that everyone who divorces his wife, except for the reason of unchastity, makes her commit adultery; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery." (Matthew 5:32- the word "unchastity" here referred to an illicit marriage due to incest, etc.)



It is sometimes possible for the person to remarry if they obtain an annulment.

A divorced Catholic has the right according to Canon Law to ask the Church to do an investigation into the marriage to find out whether the marriage was sacramentally invalid from the beginning. The proper term for this is "declaration of nullity" because the Church cannot "annul" a marriage, but only studies it to discover if it was always null and invalid from the beginning. Sometimes a negative decision is rendered if it cannot be proven that the marriage was contracted invalidly (because of immaturity, deception, lack of due discretion, etc.)

If you need to petition for an annulment here at St. Joseph's Parish, the process is simple.

We try to make it easy to understand by explaining it twice. First, you call the parish office and make an appointment with Fr. Mark or with any priest so that the priest can explain the process and give you a packet of questions which you will have to answer in writing. There are six pages of questions which you must answer about your marriage. Next, you make an appointment to meet with a tribunal aide, who is a layperson from our parish who will explain the process to you again and help you along the way. There are two people who will help you understand how to fill out the questionnaires properly. Once the questionnaires have been properly filled out, they are submitted to the Marriage Tribunal of the Diocese of Stockton. There are fees which help offset the expenses of running the Tribunal office, but consideration is given if you cannot afford it or need to make delayed payments. The process takes time (usually a year or more), but it is worth the effort because of the hope of receiving declaration of nullity which would allow a future marriage.

In the next issue of Live the Faith we will look in more detail about the process of meeting with our parish tribunal aide and then submitting paperwork to the Marriage Tribunal of the Diocese of Stockton. Gratefully. Serve Responsibly. Give Generously.




