

stories of three saintly individuals who needed help from the Immaculate Virgin Mary in order to discover their vocations.

Blessed Miriam Teresa Demjanovich (1901-1927) grew up in New Jersey and had great difficulty trying to figure out her vocation. As a teenager she wanted to become a nun, but she had to remain at home to take care of her mother who was sick. Before her mother died, she urged Miriam to go to college, since she was a brilliant student. After college she tried to enter a Carmelite Convent in the Bronx, but she was rejected because of poor eyesight. She tried working as a teacher. Then she was encouraged to enter the Sisters of Charity, the congregation founded by St. Elizabeth Ann Seton. The sisters told her to pray a novena in honor of Our Lady, since the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, December 8, was approaching. After this, she surprised the sisters by announcing that she wanted to be a Sister of Charity. She said she no longer had any doubts: “I felt that should the earth quake and the stars of heaven should fall around me, nothing could disturb my calm. I was certain that I was his spouse.” She entered the convent in early 1925 and died on May 8, 1927. During her short life as a sister she enjoyed extraordinary mystical experiences and wrote about the spiritual life.

The Blessed Virgin Mary also helped **St. Gianna Molla** to discern her vocation, but in a surprising way. St. Gianna was born on October 4, 1922, and grew up in a family which produced several priests, religious sisters, doctors and missionaries. Gianna became a medical doctor and wanted to join her brother as missionary in Brazil, but her poor health made this impossible. In 1954, she made on a pilgrimage to Lourdes where she asked Our Lady to help

When she returned home, she realized that she was called to be married, because she met her future husband, Pietro, on December 8, 1954, which was the Feast of the Immaculate Conception and the 100th anniversary of the day on which Pope Pius IX solemnly defined the dogma of the Immaculate Conception. She wrote to a friend, “I have been to Lourdes to ask our Lady what I shall do: to go to the missions or to marry. I reached home...and Pietro came in!” Gianna became a saint because of her virtues as a doctor, wife and mother, and also because of her heroic sacrifice which saved the life of her fourth child. She chose to die rather than to have an abortion which would have saved her life. Her daughter Gianna Emanuela is still alive and was present at her mother’s canonization in 2004.

St. Anthony Claret (1807-1870) was another saint who needed a gentle push from the Blessed Virgin Mary to recognize his vocation. When he was only five years old he wanted to be a priest in order to “preach and exhort people to save themselves from falling into hell.” But he began to work in his father’s textile shop and became a very successful weaver. He had a great aptitude for business and soon forgot his desire for priesthood. He became somewhat of a workaholic and lost his love for spirituality. His overexertion caught up with him during the extremely hot summer of 1826. He was refreshing himself by wading in the ocean when suddenly a huge wave struck him and carried him out to sea. He couldn’t swim but miraculously he stayed afloat, and He began to call out to the Blessed Virgin Mary for help, and suddenly he found himself safely back at shore! He began to shake with emotion and gratitude and he resolved to forsake his worldly ways. He was ordained a priest and became a famous writer and preacher of devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. He established the Claretian Order, and became the Archbishop of Cuba where he suffered fifteen assassination attempts! Immaculate Virgin Mary Help our Young People to hear your Son’s call!


Fr. Sekar - My Vocation Story



I was born and raised in Udavilai, in the state of Tamilnadu of South India. It is an amazing place geographically where the Bay of Bengal, the Arabian Sea, and the Indian Ocean confluence. Tamil was my first language, and it is a classical language. Tamil is an official language of two countries, Sri Lanka and Singapore. It has official status in my state, the state of Tamil Nadu and the Indian Union Territory of Puducherry (French colony). I had my junior and senior schooling in my hometown. We have a Catholic church and our the patron saint is

St. Francis Xavier, one of the founders of Society of Jesus (Jesuits). Our district is blessed with this saint because he walked in our streets and baptized our ancestors and built many churches. He is also the patron saint of our district (Kanyakumari), and December 3rd, the feast day of St. Francis Xavier is an official holiday for our district. This saint has been a great inspiration all along in my life. I was an altar server in my home church. After my senior school, I went to a vocation camp and got selected to pursue my priestly formation. I had my two years of initiation studies in my diocesan minor seminary, "St Aloysius' Minor Seminary", and I went to college and graduated. Then I was sent to two parishes for practical training in relating to people. That period was called regency. After my regency, I went to the major seminary to study Theology, a four-year course. At that time, I discerned my vocation and at the end of my theological course, I was ordained as a deacon. My diaconate ordination was the most memorable day in my life on April 2nd, 2005. After my ordination, I was a pastor in two parishes back in my home diocese, "Diocese of Kuzhithurai." I came to New York in 2015 for a summer ministry and got invited by the diocese of Stockton to continue my priestly ministry in the United States. I enjoy my priestly life. It has been fourteen years since I became a priest. I really love my priesthood. I am very excited to work and serve at St. Joseph's church here in Modesto. I love all the staff and parishioners.

I play keyboard, tabla, thappu and guitar. I play basketball and work out at Planet Fitness. I love to sing and listen to Catholic music. I do snow camping, biking, kayaking, and river rafting with Fr. Mark. He is an amazing pastor. My simple prayer every day is "Thank You Jesus For This Wonderful Day."



Fr. Agustino M. Torres, C.F.R

When Father Torres gives one of his frequent talks at youth retreats and other events, he is using the public speaking skills he developed on Seton Hall University's speech and debate team as an undergraduate there in the late 1990s. "I didn't really do debate, I did a lot more of acting 'slash' speech writing," said Father Torres, 32, who attended Seton Hall on a speech and debate scholarship. "It was a great learning experience," he said. "We traveled the country going to great universities, holding tournaments. It was really crucial to honing the way I organize, not just talks, but so much else. I'm so indebted to those experiences." Father Torres, who grew up in south Texas, was already considering the priesthood by the time he was ready for college. In college, he first encountered the Franciscan Friars of the Renewal, the order that he joined in 1999. Though slightly put off at first by the robes, sandals and beards that the friars wore, he was greatly attracted by their joyful and unabashed faith life. "I saw men my age, coming from all over the world, who loved the same things I loved the Eucharistic holy hours and praying the Rosary every day."

"I felt like I had found my place in the world. It was a confirmation that the Holy Spirit was really moving."
