Living the Faith:

Growing up, I remember that in our house, and also in my grandmother's house, there were some quite ugly ceramic dishes and statues. I later learned that these came from a ceramic factory

that was owned by my great-grandfather in the city of Trier, Germany.

Last month I had the opportunity to visit the ancient city of Trier while on vacation with my parents. In the morning we went on a guided tour of the city (the ceramic factory was not part of the tour because it no longer exists!). After the walking tour, my parents were exhausted, and so in the afternoon I went alone by bicycle to the medieval Abbey of St. Matthias, which is just outside the city. I wanted to make a personal pilgrimage because it happened to be the day of my 28th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood, and St. Matthias Abbey is the only place in Northern Europe where you can visit the tomb of one of the twelve Apostles. Tradition holds that the relics of St. Matthias were brought here from Jerusalem in the fourth century by the Roman empress St. Helena.

St. Matthias was actually the 13th apostle. The Bible says that after Judas the betrayer committed suicide, they chose a replacement by "casting lots" (similar to "flipping a coin"). First they chose two potential candidates who had accompanied Jesus since the beginning. The Bible says: "So they proposed two, Joseph called

Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. Then they prayed, 'You, Lord, who know the hearts of all, show which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this apostolic ministry from which Judas turned away to go to his own place.' Then they gave lots to them, and the lot fell upon Matthias, and he was counted with the eleven apostles" (Acts 1:23-26)

Upon entering, I took the stone stairs into the lower church (the "crypt"), where I had the place to myself. I was along with St. Matthias, whom I found in his stone sarcophagus. There I sat with him meditating in the stony silence. I began to feel that I was actually in the presence of the true relics of the body of St. Matthias, because an inspired idea came into my hard head. From heaven, St. Matthias gave me an idea that filled me with gratitude for the gift of priesthood I had received 28 years before on that very day. I suddenly realized that I was lucky to have been chosen. Just like Matthias could have not been an apostle, I could have not been a priest. What a wonderful coincidence that on my anniversary day I was able to have this private colloquy with the patron saint of lucky guys!

We are nearing the end of 2015, the "Year for Consecrated Life" which was dedicated by Pope Francis to honoring and praying for the men and women who consecrate their lives to God as religious priests and sisters. We need to pray that more young men and women would consider themselves lucky to be called to the priesthood or the religious life. This month we have lost two of our priests here at St. Joseph's: Fr. Hamilton has returned to his diocese in Colombia and Fr. Edwin has gone to work as chaplain for the Modesto hospitals. Fr. Francis went on vacation, and then there was one! I



am the only priest here during most of the month of November and we must bring in priests from neighboring parishes to help with Masses and confessions.

Nevertheless, I am full of gratitude to God and hope for the future. If there were only one priest left in the whole city, then I think some young men would take notice and see the importance of the priesthood and would respond to the call. The other day on Catholic radio I heard an interesting comment from Dr. Rosalind Moss who said that if we don't have priests, then we won't have Mass, and if we don't have Mass, then we won't have the universe. The Eucharist keeps the world going.

The story of St. Matthias proves that God's plan from the beginning has always included specially chosen men to fulfill the essential roles of apostle and priest. Jesus said: "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest" (Matthew 9:37-38).

I invite everyone to join us for the three nights of our Advent Mission which will be December 20-22 (Sunday, December 20 in the Hall and December 21-22 in the church). We will enjoy talks by Fr. Chad Wahl, who is one of the few American-born priests of our Diocese and who will speak to us as about vocations and about the fact that all of us are called to holiness!

Growth and Facilities Update from the Building Committee




Your parish Building Committee has been hard at work for the past year developing and executing a Facility Improvement Plan. Your monthly support of the Blue Facility

Improvement Fund envelopes funds this work and they are very grateful for your generosity. Previously reports were provided about the remodeling and construction projects in both the JP2 Center and the Church vestibule. There are some elements of each that are awaiting completion, but if you have not visited the interior of the JP2 Center lately, we recommend you do so and view the difference. The Building Committee is chaired by Rick Dinubilo, with members Jason Jackson, Sue Forrest, Mel Noack, Alan Saca, Pat Seefeldt, Mike Ijams, Don Baumgratz and Jim Hicks. Each member is lead on a project or two throughout the year and spend a considerable amount of time with scope, bid review and completion details.

Some great news: The Eastern end of the JP2 Building (offices immediately next to the parish library) will revert back to parish use effective November 2. They were previously used as sales offices by Clear Channel Communications. This extra space of a little over 3,000 sq. ft. will allow us to provide a much larger meeting room for this building. Final interior remodeling should be completed as early as the end of December, after which parish activities can begin to be scheduled.

New project: Many of you have heard or read about plans to create a small addition to our parish office so that the SVDP Food Pantry operations can accommodate the growth of those who are in need of basic food. Currently, SVDP volunteers are working out of a very limited space as they provide 1,000+ bags of groceries each month. The Many Hands, Many Hearts, One Mission committee knew this when they approached Fr. Mark earlier this year about dedicating one half of the Annual Gala proceeds to this effort. Their hope is that the generosity of our parishioners and Gala supporters will be enough to fund this construction addition and remodeling. More information about the final plans will be forthcoming, as well as progress to fund all of it. Due to the generosity of several generous parishioners, who embrace the call to

World Youth Day Fundraiser



Year of Mercy...



In April Pope Francis surprised the world by announcing that 2016 would be the "Jubilee Year of Mercy." Beginning on December 8, 2015, we will spend a year reflecting on how God is merciful, how we need to be merciful, and about how we can experience God's mercy in the Sacrament of Reconciliation ("Confession") and through the gift of indulgences granted by the church. Pope Francis wrote: "When faced with the gravity of sin, God responds with the fullness of mercy." (Misericordiae Vultus, #3)

Here at St. Joseph's, we will also give special emphasis to the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy. During December we will focus on "Feeding the Hungry" and "Giving drink to the thirsty." For us the Year of Mercy will begin with the distribution of our St. Vincent de Paul Christmas food baskets, which feed over 350 families each year; as well as the scheduling of our St. Joseph's Bread Ministry.

Works of Mercy for December:

"Feed the Hungry" and "Give drink to the thirsty"

Parish Action: Support the works of our St. Vincent de Paul Ministry, as well as our St. Joseph's Bread Ministry, whose members prepare and serve food at the Salvation Army Homeless Shelter throughout the year.

Each December, our St. Vincent de Paul Ministry provides nearly 400 Christmas Baskets to those

in need. The "Baskets" contain the staples for a wonderful Christmas meal. **Christmas Basket supplies needed include:**

- *Brownie Mix*
- *Canned yams or sweet potatoes*
- *Jello*
- *Canned Cranberry sauce/jelly*
- *Canned pineapple*

We will also see the return of the famous: **Great Ham Race**, as we follow "Mr. Ham's" race to receive the needed 350 canned hams for the Christmas Baskets. Mr. Ham's


