

Christian and who is not?

We who are Catholics don't like it when people accuse us of not being Christian, and that is why we usually avoid accusing others of not being Christian. We all share the desire of Our Lord Himself: that all Christians would be gathered into one fold with one shepherd (John 10:16), instead of having many flocks and many different pastors. I am the pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic Church. My main task is to shepherd the Catholic sheep, but I am also concerned about the "other sheep." I want to convince them that we are good people and that that we are good Christians and good neighbors, who are interested in equal rights, fair laws, and safe borders; and that we are good law-abiding Americans.

This year we are trying to show the community that we are good Christians who practice works of mercy. Pope Francis has declared 2016 to be a "Year of Mercy," and we are practicing both Corporal and Spiritual "works of mercy" in our community. We have shown that we "feed the hungry" by distributing over 500 Christmas food baskets and "clothe the naked" by collecting and distributing 1,000 jackets for the needy. During this holy season of Lent, our focus is on the Spiritual "works of mercy," such as "Admonish the sinners," "Forgive offenses willingly," Bear wrongs patiently," and "Console the doubtful." By these works, we hope that we will be seen as people of mercy who care about the welfare of every human person.

We hope that people will see that the teachings of our Catholic Church are all about love and mercy. We do not believe that abortion is good for women; we disagree that euthanasia is merciful; we do not believe that the gay lifestyle is healthy. We point to scientific research, which shows that sex-change operations are not good therapy, and to statistics that prove that same-sex marriage is not good for raising children. Some people disagree with our Church teachings and they say that we are not merciful, and that we do not love our neighbors. This is not true. We worry about people who do things that are really harmful to themselves and others. We believe that our merciful God guides our Church to always teach the truths which will benefit humanity.

One thing that must definitely be said about being a Christian is that we are Pro-Life. From the very beginning, Christians were known for protecting all human life. If people saw a family walking in the street with a child with a birth disability, they would say: "Look, there's a Christian family." This is because at that time infanticide was widely practiced by everyone except Christians. Pagan families disposed of newborn babies with disabilities by drowning them in water or by exposing them in the sun.

As Catholic Christians we try to love all people in the best way we know how. We try to show gentle mercy toward every person and toward all human life. We try to walk in harmony with all those who call themselves Christians, even when they disagree with us about what that means.

Year of Mercy

Works for this month:

Don't let old wounds ruin a relationship. Resentment is like a poison that eats us up inside. Don't lose a friendship because of something stupid.

Forgiveness is difficult. C.S. Lewis wrote: "Everyone says that forgiveness is a lovely idea until they have something to forgive."

Forgiving is a decision, not a feeling. It doesn't mean that you have to have positive feelings toward the person (you don't need to feel warm tummy feelings!). You might continue to feel angry for the rest of your life, but this does not necessarily mean that you have not forgiven the person. Just try!

Abused people often become abusers. Hurt people hurt others. Break the cycle by letting go of resentment and praying for the person who offended you!

Works for this month:

Pray for people who are sad and full of doubt and indecision regarding their Catholic faith.

Pray for Catholic college students who are confused and scandalized by atheistic professors

Pray for the priests and bishops whose task it is to counsel the doubtful by means of preaching.

Pray for the catechists and Catholic teachers and professors whose task it is to counsel the doubtful by means of teaching.

Commit yourself to learning about the Catholic faith so that you can share your understanding of the faith with others.

Offer words of encouragement to those who are uneducated about their Catholic religion.



New Director of Religious Education



I am a California native recently returned from a 15 year stint in North Carolina where I served as a professor of apologetics (the defense of the faith) at a small Evangelical seminary. Returning to California is a joy for me and my family (especially the grandparents of our four children!). How I came to be the DRE at St. Joseph's is a rather unusual story.

I became a Christian at the age of 18 just as I entered college. I spent several years working in sales and then married the most beautiful girl I had ever dated. Shortly thereafter, we moved to North Carolina to begin my graduate studies in Christian apologetics, theology, and philosophy. For the next ten years I was

a dedicated Evangelical Christian – climbing the ministry ladder in my various roles as student, minister, professor, author, and speaker.


The more I learned, the more convinced I became that issues surrounding the biblical canon, Christian orthodoxy, and various theological disputes, were not resolvable on the Evangelical system. For five years I engaged in a serious, heart-wrenching, process of discernment during which I began to reconsider the historic Church. During this inquiry, I found it increasingly difficult to defend the anti-Catholic rhetoric I had been taught. I capped off this period by attending an excellent RCIA program at my local parish, resulting in my being received into full communion with the Catholic Church.

My passion now is to help others discover the truth of Catholicism from whatever starting point they are at - be they atheists, pagans, Protestants, or lapsed Catholics. To that end, I will be offering my support and guidance to the numerous educational offerings already in place at St. Joseph's, and also devoting energy to revamping the adult education component. So be on the lookout for new Adult Bible and Faith studies! It means so much to me to be back in California working for my Church! I look forward to meeting and working with you all.
